To enhance the effectiveness of NGOs in contributing to Vikasit Bharat, the government must:

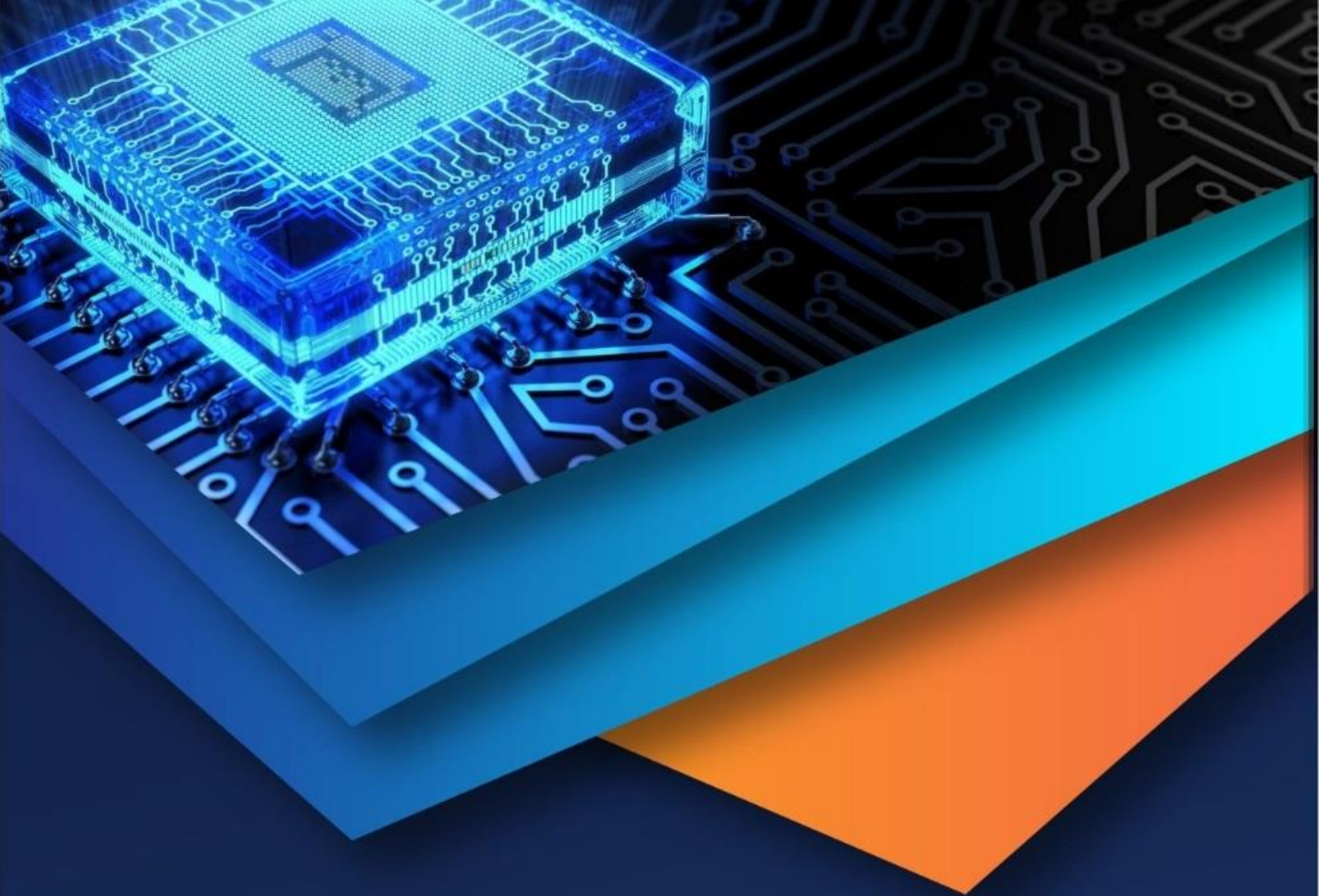
- Develop transparent and simplified policies for NGO registration, FCRA compliance, and funding.
