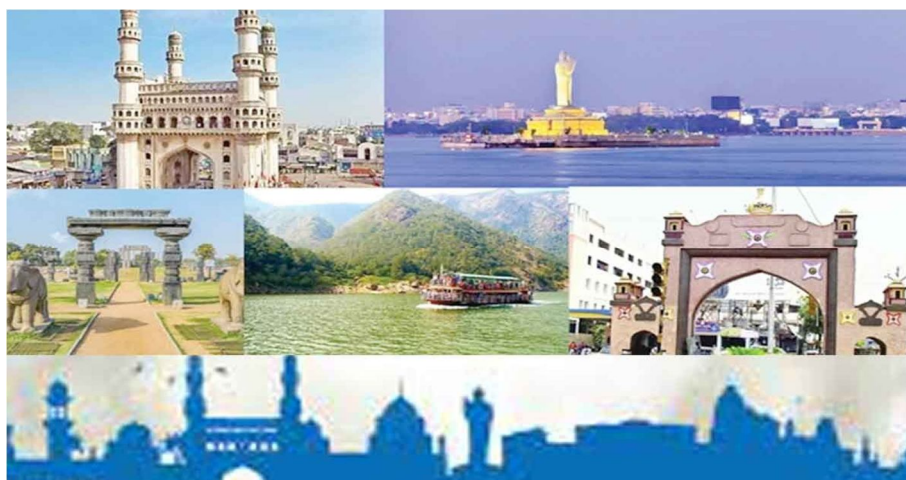
### C. *Spiritual and Cultural Travel*
